He comes to work around 8 o'clock most every morning, leaves at 5:00. Doesn't go to a cookout, doesn't go have drinks with his buddies, doesn't play golf. He goes home to his family. That's Monday through Friday. Saturday sometimes he and his dad will go fishing when he's not -- not with his wife and children. Sunday he

goes to church. Next Monday he repeats it all over again 52 weeks out of the year. I think maybe he's gone on vacation sometime. I don't remember when it was but wasn't for very long if he did. And so you know Jim's a native of Port St. Joe. He loves the He works hard for the city and he doesn't sit in his office filing his nails and eating bon bons. He's a hard worker. And with that being said I'd like to throw out a proposal to the board that we have a workshop. Any commissioner that has a problem with Jim or where he has deficiencies, let's work through those deficiencies. And I think in the end result it will be better for the board and it will be better for Jim, and we can all -- all work together. We've got to, you know to make this city go forward we need to, we need to work together. I'd like to hear from the other commissioners if they feel like a workshop would be in order. think that's proper way to get this get resolved.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Sorry for being late everybody. Where we at?

COMMISSIONER ASHBROOK: It's all yours now Mayor.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Where we at? Tell me where we at.

COMMISSIONER ASHBROOK: We're discussing amongst the board. Two of us have spoke.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Okay. If I could just interject for just one moment just you know to let everybody know, we're here today. I appreciate everybody being here. We do need your input on everything on we do. This is a personnel matter within the city, and we're here today.

MAYOR PATTERSON: -- and him being able -- him being able to lead us in this city matter. But the paperwork here said termination. My words were discussion of the city manager. I never used the word termination I guarantee everybody in this room that. I had a witness in the room with me when I talked, and I will go back and ask that person to clarify that, but I'm pretty sure I didn't say termination. I've never said termination. So I just wanted to make that -- that pretty clear.

And just would to like to address the audience today that you will have your turn to speak. There are quite a few people here today so I would ask you

to, we're going to limit you to three minutes. I would ask you to stay on the agenda item, and I would ask you to refrain from clapping, loud hollering. Let's all be respectful of one another. And when we get to your turn if you'll just raise your hand, I will point you to come up. And then when you do come up if you would just sign that paper right there before you start talking and then give us your name and your address. All right?

COMMISSIONER LOWRY: Can I just say something?
MAYOR PATTERSON: Sure.

COMMISSIONER LOWRY: Since this was brought to light I've received numerous text messages that were untrue. I've called some of those people back and discussed what was going on. Continued to receive phone calls and hateful text messages, and most of that untrue. My wife's received phone calls and text messages, and it's -- we're a tightknit community and it's, this has got out of control. I mean I understand people's feelings and -- and one way or another, but it's bad when it gets hateful. It's bad when it gets hateful in a campaign race that's going on right now.

I mean it's -- I ask everybody to continue our tightknit, tightknitness that we have within this

community. Anybody else anything?

COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: I had many, many phone calls, many, many texts, text messages. I've had text messages from friends and have spoken to a lot of people in my community about the situation, and I'm my own man. I make my own decisions. I'm not a yes man. I don't appreciate some of the text messages that were sent out. If you want to see me, you know where to see me at. I'm not hard to find. I'm not a coward.

I just want to say that I support my community. I support the entire city of Port St. Joe, but I was born and raised in north Port St. Joe, Florida, and the opportunities that we've been denied for so long because we haven't had a voice, that's what I'm making my decision on. So if anybody got any questions or want to see me, you know where to find me at.

MAYOR PATTERSON: That all Commissioner?

COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: That's it.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Okay. Gentlemen, none of this is easy. Don't look at us and think this is easy for us because it's not. We have a hard job to do sometimes, and we have to make decisions.

Sometimes they're the right ones, sometimes they're

not the right ones, but we hope that we make the right decision. But as I say, at this time I have lost confidence in Jim Patterson being able to run the day-to-day operations of the city, and you know that's where I'm at with it. I just --

COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: Mayor, I spoke earlier. You weren't here, and I threw out a proposal for a -- a workshop to work through the deficiencies, work through the problems with Jim, let him know what we expect of him. MAYOR PATTERSON: Along with my reasons for Jim being dismissed I have lived the last seven months in fear of my life.

(Laughter from the audience.)

MAYOR PATTERSON: Go ahead and laugh about it. He threatened me.

UNIDENTIFIED: Everybody give the gentleman a speaking chance. We asking -- you tell us why now. We'll respect you.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Sure, exactly.

Last September we were going through budget session. I was trying to save you citizens some money plus get you some more time for my code enforcement, okay? I went to Mr. Anderson's office and told him my intentions. Told him what I was going to do. I went upstairs. I talked to the code enforcement. I got him to commit to more hours, giving us two Saturdays a month, and he wasn't working any Saturdays. I got him to drop his pay from \$20 to \$18. It would have been about the same money but at least he got more hours, he wouldn't get more pay. When I went and discussed it with him, we had a good discussion, I went back downstairs. I told Mr. Anderson what we'd talked about. He said okay. I said if you don't mind,

call the other commissioners and see what they think about it. Now later on he told me that I told him to tell the commissioners. I ain't never told him to tell nobody nothing. I can tell you that right now. I don't do that. I ask. I don't do that. I really don't.

So at that time I thought everything was fine.

Come up to a meeting a few days later, and I thought everything was fine as I say, so I'm fixing to tell the crowd what all was going on with the code enforcer, and I'm interrupted by Mr. Anderson who said that's not my job. That's his job. My question is why didn't he tell me that when I was face to face with him in his office? Why would he wait until meeting time to do it?

UNIDENTIFIED: Why don't you --

MAYOR PATTERSON: He just wanted to embarrass me or what? I don't know what it was, but I'm getting to it if you'll give me time.

UNIDENTIFIED: We will.

MAYOR PATTERSON: All right, you asked me to speak, and I'm speaking --

UNIDENTIFIED: Yes, sir, go ahead.

MAYOR PATTERSON: -- from what I know is right.

UNIDENTIFIED: I apologize, go ahead.

MAYOR PATTERSON: That's okay.

But anyway, the next morning I went in and talked to Mr. Anderson about what had happened at the meeting, and we was just having you know fairly general conversation about what happened. We weren't hollering and yelling at one another or nothing, but just like he's doing right now, he looked at me and smiled and smirked and pointed his finger at me. He said, "Mr. Mayor, if you don't leave me alone, I'm going to bring fire and fury on you."

UNIDENTIFIED: Whoo.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Hey, I went straight to the sheriff's office because I believed him. I believed what he told me. He had no reason to lie to me. He was going to bring fire and fury, and it sounds funny to y'all, but if you were me --

UNIDENTIFIED: Was there a witness to that?

MAYOR PATTERSON: -- and somebody's threatened you with your life, it wouldn't be funny. I guarantee you it wouldn't. It wouldn't be funny.

And that's what happened that day in his office.

| 24 | UNIDENTIFIED WOMAN: I want to speak. I'm next |

1 TURNER ECHOLS: -- his girlfriend to the ex, well it was her husband at the time that he was 2 3 seeing --4 MAYOR PATTERSON: Where? 5 TURNER ECHOLS: -- because the mayor showed up 6 at my house screaming and yelling. I have witnesses for that. I have about 30 witnesses at Sister's. 7 8 MAYOR PATTERSON: How long ago was that? 9 TURNER ECHOLS: It was two and a half years 10 ago. 11 MAYOR PATTERSON: Okay --12 TURNER ECHOLS: That, yeah. But what happened 13 at Sister's last Tuesday is fresh. 14 MAYOR PATTERSON: Mr. Attorney? MR. ALBRITTON: Yes. 15 MAYOR PATTERSON: What can I do in this 16 17 situation? He's not staying on the program. 18 TURNER ECHOLS: No, you talking about people 19 giving death threats, I've got witnesses of death 20 threats by you and your girlfriend. 21 MR. ALBRITTON: Mayor, at this time since the 22 city manager's requested written charges and a 23 formal hearing --TURNER ECHOLS: You calling me a liar? 24 25 MR. ALBRITTON: -- I would suggest to the board

1 that we reconvene this so that he can have the opportunity to see those written charges as he's so 2 demanded. 3 MAYOR PATTERSON: All right, and we do no 4 5 action today? Is that what you're saying? 6 MR. ALBRITTON: The only action pursuant to the 7 charter that the city can take is to suspend him 8 pending the formal hearing that he has demanded. 9 MAYOR PATTERSON: All right. TURNER ECHOLS: You really don't want me to 10 11 talk, do you? MAYOR PATTERSON: I'll let --12 13 TURNER ECHOLS: Let's talk about calling me a 14 liar. MAYOR PATTERSON: Get him out of here. 1.5 UNIDENTIFIED: Sure can we talk --16 17 MAYOR PATTERSON: You want to talk about 18 personal problems. TURNER ECHOLS: I think you need a drug test. 19 Will you submit to a drug test? You did a -- will 20 you submit to a drug test? 21 22 MAYOR PATTERSON: Chief. REESE ANTLEY: Sir, sir, I've got some serious 23 24 questions, and it's not about personal --25 TURNER ECHOLS: This is serious.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Yes, sir, it sure is.

2 TURNER ECHOLS: It's real serious.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Yes, sir.

REESE ANTLEY: I agree, but I have some questions that are specific to what's going on.

TURNER ECHOLS: There's an investigation he doesn't know about.

MR. ALBRITTON: Again, Mayor, at this time the city manager's demanded --

MAYOR PATTERSON: Step to the side, please.

MR. ALBRITTON: -- the enforcement of Section 34 which requires written charges. The only action item at this point the city can take is to suspend him. If you read through the charter my suggestion is at the very least that this matter be reconvened so that the city can provide Mr. Anderson with the written charges he has so demanded and he is so entitled to.

The only other item that this commotion in regards to this can take up is whether or not to suspend him until such time that hearing has been had. There is, legally there's no other option for the city commission at this point. Mr. Anderson is entitled to his hearing, and he's entitled to his written charges. So the only action item right now

that the city can take as to Mr. Anderson is to 1 2 whether or not to suspend him until such time. COMMISSIONER ASHBROOK: What do we do with the 3 motion? 4 5 MR. ALBRITTON: You'd have to withdraw the 6 motion until such time as the hearing's been had. 7 After the hearing is concluded and Mr. Anderson's demand been met then the city will have to take 8 9 action at that point. 10 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: I would like, I would like to hear what some of the citizens have to say 11 12 before we take anymore action. Whether we withdraw 13 the motion or whatever, but I would like to hear 14 what the citizens have to say. 15 UNIDENTIFIED: Absolutely. 16 COMMISSIONER LOWRY: We need to probably 17 withdraw? MAYOR PATTERSON: Huh? 18 19 COMMISSIONER ASHBROOK: He needs to withdraw. 20 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: Yeah, I withdraw my 21 second. COMMISSIONER LOWRY: I withdraw my first. 22 23 MAYOR PATTERSON: All right. All right, now 24 Mr. Anderson has already asked for his public 25 hearing so we're going to still let the public talk, and we'll start with you, sir.

REESE ANTLEY: All right, Reese Antley, 464
Anglefish Street.

First let me just say something to the commission. You guys work for us, the people. As you can see by the people that are here and what you're going to hear next, Jim Anderson is the one person at city hall that stands for anything for the most part. I'm just being honest. There's a few people up there for the most part, but you guys work for us. To come in here and fire him without cause, the cause should be that the people are crying out for a termination or he's done something wrong. But to state as you lost, Brett, you lost confidence, is that correct? So what is the — why did you lose confidence? Has he done something in his job that you guys have reprimanded him for to lost confidence?

This isn't Bo's Pest Control. This isn't
Buzzett's Drugstore. This is the City of Port St.
Joe. This isn't Wood's Fishery where I can fire
whoever I want to whenever I want to. This is the
city. He works for us so why did you lose
confidence in him?

COMMISSIONER LOWRY: I'll discuss that later at

1 the hearing. REESE ANTLEY: This is the time to discuss it 2 3 so to us --COMMISSIONER LOWRY: I'll discuss it at the 4 5 hearing. 6 MAYOR PATTERSON: He's asked for a hearing so. 7 REESE ANTLEY: I understand that but us as the 8 city, as the, as the people that put you in office, 9 that put every one of you in office, you owe us the explanation so we can make our call on whether Jim 10 11 should be fired or he should stay on. At this point you guys are looking like you just have a vendetta 12 13 against Jim. 14 COMMISSIONER LOWRY: I promise we don't. haven't discussed that. 1.5 UNIDENTIFIED WOMAN: You can't handle the 16 17 pressure you should resign. 18 REESE ANTLEY: And I'm just going to end with 19 this because there's a lot of people that want to 20 talk. 21 MAYOR PATTERSON: Yes, sir. 22 REESE ANTLEY: But for the meeting that you 2.3 called at 10 o'clock you were late. They had to 24 start without our mayor.

MAYOR PATTERSON: And without our attorney.

25

REESE ANTLEY: Well does that -- that to me is a write-up. If my people are late at work, you're written up.

You're in here with a bunch of people that took off work out of respect for everybody here. You should have been here on time.

MAYOR PATTERSON: I thought I was getting here on time.

REESE ANTLEY: Okay. Listen, I think you guys should be held to the same standard we are, and I'm not going down the petty thing, but I do believe you need to take a drug test and a sobriety test.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Thank you for your comment. Thank you.

Yes, ma'am.

PAULA PICKETT: My name is Paula Pickett, 108

Sunset Circle, Port St. Joe. I have worked in public service through the county as well as the chamber of commerce for over 14 years. I have worked with three city managers. I have never worked with a finer person that Jim Anderson. I have met with him on a variety of occasions over the last years. Never has he made any, any threatening statements to me, and I have asked him some tough questions, and we've jumped some hurdles together.

Never has he had anything but the utmost respect for me, and I would venture to say anybody else in this room that's been in his office.

He does work for me. He is the one I go to when I have problems. I've never called any one of you. You're welcome. I know how to get my problems solved, and Jim Anderson does it. And he does it respectfully and timely.

You guys have a hard job. I completely respect your ability to run for office. You've shown tenacity and thick skinness sometimes to your own detriment. I urge you to listen to these people. You may have lacked confidence for some personal reason with Jim, but nobody in here has. In fact I've got more confidence in him than I do any one of you.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Thank you, ma'am. Thank you.

AMY ROGERS: Amy Rogers, and I signed my name
on the sign-in pad. I'm a registered voter, and a
citizen of Port St. Joe.

I am concerned with, as I received one of your documents I did not see where there was any poor work performance, no evaluation that was taken place for Mr. Anderson's, the question to have him terminated. I, when I make a conscious decision on

voting, I want to know what I'm voting for. I just, I don't want to vote because so and so told me vote for this person and vote for that person, pass you a piece of paper and vote for that person. I'm a educated person, and I like to know what I'm voting for. And as I read the little paragraph all inside, according to the paragraphs again there's no evaluation been taken place, no, he has no discrepancies in his work performance, and I'd like to leave here today with some facts of what has happened regarding his work performance.

Now if he's been insubordinated, I didn't see anything on insubordination. I feel like in a situation like this the city do, we still practice affirmative action where you have stated that you're a equal opportunity employee person. There is a process and a procedure that the city has gone about with other employees where they call a fact finding conference. With this particular matter it might be the city commissioners, but, and some of the peoples in his workplace area it would be a fact finding conference so they can go gather the facts up and then bring it back to the board and find out, that's when you act on it. But the one-day thing with no work, no work discrepancies and no problem with his

work performance, I can't vote on anything like that. And as a citizen and a registered voter, I want to be able to vote on facts, okay.

Let's do a workshop and as Commissioner Buzzett has stated earlier about a workshop so you can gather up the facts for an individual. And as what, I have to disagree with you a little bit Commissioner Langston. There have been some work that the city has done for North Port St. Joe.

COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: I didn't say the city didn't do any you know work for Port St. Joe. I said we've been deprived for a long time on the north side. That's what my statements was.

AMY ROGERS: Well -- okay, well then -- COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: I know you can't disagree with that.

AMY ROGERS: Yes, we have --

COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: If you disagree with that is, I don't understand what you're talking about.

AMY ROGERS: Well okay. Yes, we have socially been, we are socially deprived and been depressed for many, many years, but there are several things that the city has helped with North Port St. Joe --

COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: And they always have.

1 I never said they didn't. AMY ROGERS: -- but they're still short, you 2 3 know. COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: I never said they 4 5 didn't. 6 AMY ROGERS: But we've --7 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: I said we've been 8 deprived. 9 AMY ROGERS: Yeah, okay. COMMISSIONER LOWRY: That's what I said. 10 11 That's what I stated. AMY ROGERS: Yes, sir, I agree with you on 12 we've been socially deprived. We are a socially 13 14 deprived community, but with the fact that I do know 15 the city has helped some, but they're very short on 16 a lot of things that need to be done. But the majority of the things that need to be done is for 17 18 us to ask for. And all of our community, we want, 19 we want to stay in within the area that we can 20 receive funds with current CRA, but if we go and restrict that to another section only --21 MAYOR PATTERSON: Well, Miss Amy, we're not 22 talking about the CRA's. We're not talking about 23 24 it. What I'm just saying that 25 AMY ROGERS: I know.

1 that's one of the ways that we get help. sometimes we shoot our ownself in the foot --2 3 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: Right --AMY ROGERS: -- and don't realize later on. 4 5 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: -- like what you're 6 doing right now. 7 AMY ROGERS: So we want, what I'm saying right 8 now is that we want to get some help for the entire 9 community and not stay, make -- work on being. COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: I didn't say it -- I 10 11 said I'm, I represent the entire community. 12 AMY ROGERS: Yeah. 13 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: I said that before I 14 said anything about the north side. What I said was I represent the entire community, but I was born and 15 raised in North Port St. Joe, and we haven't had a 16 17 voice in 10 years, almost 10 years to come up and 18 represent what we need over on the north side. 19 didn't say I didn't represent the entire North, entire community of Port St. Joe, Florida, ma'am. 20 2.1 AMY ROGERS: Okay, I'm not -- we have had --22 MAYOR PATTERSON: All right, your three minutes 23 is up, ma'am. 24 AMY ROGERS: We have had many commissioners 25 African and American --

MAYOR PATTERSON: Thank you, ma'am. 1 2 AMY ROGERS: -- and we have had some help, but 3 we've not fulfilled it yet and that's all I'm just 4 saying. COMMISSIONER ASHBROOK: Okay, fine. 5 AMY ROGERS: The dream is unfulfilled --6 7 COMMISSIONER ASHBROOK: Thank you. 8 AMY ROGERS: -- and yes, it does, and we thank 9 you for your --MAYOR PATTERSON: Well thank you for your time, 10 11 Miss Amy. Thank you. AMY ROGERS: Thank you. You're quite welcome, 12 13 sir. 14 MAYOR PATTERSON: Come on up. Sign in please. 15 LISA MATTHEWS: I've signed in already. 16 MAYOR PATTERSON: All right. 17 LISA MATTHEWS: Okay, my name is Lisa Matthews. I live at 312 Avenue F, and I think this whole 18 19 setting is all a little bit much. I think that you commissioners with Mr. Anderson have done a little 20 21 bit out of, out of concert, context, but I agree with Mr. Langston. I've only been back here since 22 23 2013, and I've seen things that are just outrageous. 24 We have sent paperwork to Mr. Anderson that he

hasn't responded to as far as the PAC, and he pushed

them aside. And we've got numerous phone calls 1 2 saying well where is the paperwork, where is the rezoning paperwork, and they're sitting on Mr. 3 Anderson's desk. So I'm saying we need someone 4 5 that's going to take our cause serious. We live there and sometimes it gets a little 6 bit hard to live there because of what I'm seeing, 7 what I don't see what the need is and what's not 8 9 being generated in North Port St. Joe. 10 MAYOR PATTERSON: Thank you, ma'am. Yes, sir. BRIAN WAGNER: My name is Brian Wagner, 401 11 20th Street. Just trying to summarize everything 12 13 that's kind of going on is, with respect to Mr. Langston what you said about first off being north 14 15 side Port St. Joe, until the city can move on as one --16 17 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: And again I said 18 that --BRIAN WAGNER: I'm speaking. I understand what 19 20 you said. COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: I represent --2.1 22 BRIAN WAGNER: I understand what you said. 23 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: BRIAN WAGNER: But Mr. Anderson works at the 24 25 pleasure of the commission, correct?

MAYOR PATTERSON: Sure.

BRIAN WAGNER: So if there have been issues with things not being done that Mr. Jim is not doing, as we do this meeting, Mr. Jim has asked for a meeting to hear the accusations. As a citizen, I want to see documentation of where he did not do what you asked him to do and specifically things that, I can respect —

LISA MATTHEWS: Miss Matthews.

BRIAN WAGNER: I can respect what you're saying, yes, ma'am. I don't know if you remember me or not but --

LISA MATTHEWS: I remember him.

BRIAN WAGNER: -- I would like to see personally things that he has not done for his job, if that makes any sense. Because all -- I've come to two meetings, and all I ever hear each one of you guys get up there and say what, why you're doing this is for the people, and I'm doing this, I'm all for you, I'm here foy you, I want to do what you want to do, I represent everybody but there's no facts, and I need to see facts.

MAYOR PATTERSON: I gave you some.

LISA MATTHEWS: I didn't see them.

BRIAN WAGNER: I need to see facts so we can

make a decision and not just without cause, not Just willie nillie. I mean this is official, and I know Jim personally, and I'm coming into this as open minded as I can. I respect him just like I respect each and every one of you. I want to hear what he has to say just as much as I want to hear what you guys have to say.

So as we come to this next meeting, I hope you come with more than just emotions and feelings and thoughts, and I want to see facts where he has not done the things that you've asked him to do. Thank you.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Okay. Thank you, sir. Thank you. Come on up.

SAMUEL ANDERSON, SR.: My name's Samuel Warren Anderson, Sr. I live at 512 8th Street, Port St. Joe, Florida. I was pretty much raised here.

Mr. Mayor, and every one of you commissioners,

I have all the respect for y'all. Do not get me

wrong. I'm here because the city administrator, no

matter where I live, but me living reasonably close

to the gentleman, you take a gentleman that, that

likes to hunt and fish, if he's a hard worker, which

he normally is if he does that because it takes

money to do that well, Mr. Jim, he likes making

things very pretty, beautiful, spending his time doing that.

When he's not at work and not with his family he's working on his house. Not 10:00, 11 o'clock in the morning, he drinks coffee at the crack of daylight and that gentleman is working. To me that tells me that when that man's at work, he's working just as hard. As leaders we should know this. As our main leader, Mr. Bo, you should know this. Fine example on this meeting.

I could get into it, and I could get hostile.

Believe me I'm trying not to. The accusation that
you said, and I rudely interrupted, and I very, I
apologize for that:

MAYOR PATTERSON: That's all right. That's, all right, no problem.

SAMUEL ANDERSON, SR.: Because you probably really buried yourself.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Uh-huh.

SAMUEL ANDERSON, SR.: But for you to say that man pointed at you like that and said what you said, I know word for word sir, when sit down tonight and think about the way you started this meeting out, you need to think word for word for what you said about this gentleman. I've seen him hit his hand

with a hammer, squish his foot and somebody like me, 1 buddy, the good Lord don't want to hear what I have 2 3 to say. 4 This man is, he plays with his children every evening --5 LISA MATTHEWS: That's personal. That's not 6 7 jobs. 8 SAMUEL ANDERSON, SR.: -- every evening. And I want to try end it right here saying if I lived 9 where I live, or if I lived in tim buck two, what I 10 11 know of that gentleman he never made them 12 accusations. And -- and what did you say your memo 13 read? 14 MAYOR PATTERSON: The one that was supposed to be on here was --15 16 SAMUEL ANDERSON, SR.: No, sir, what -- you 17 held it up. MAYOR PATTERSON: This one right here? 18 19 one right here says termination. SAMUEL ANDERSON, SR.: You held it up. 20 21 MAYOR PATTERSON: This one says termination but 22 it's wrong. 23 SAMUEL ANDERSON, SR.: Termination for Bo Patterson? That's what you said ain't it? 2.4 25 UNIDENTIFIED: That's what you said.

SAMUEL ANDERSON, SR.: That's what you said. 1 2 MAYOR PATTERSON: That's not --SAMUEL ANDERSON, SR.: And, sir, you see all 3 4 these fine citizens --MAYOR PATTERSON: I said Bo Patterson it would 5 have said that. 6 7 SAMUEL ANDERSON, SR.: -- of this community it 8 might be true. Thank you, sir. MAYOR PATTERSON: Yes, sir, thank you. 9 Thank 10 you. 11 Come on up. 12 JOHNNY LINTON: Johnny Linton, 2025 Marvin Avenue. I want you to hear what I'm saying. I hung 13 out the door of a helicopter for two years, got shot 14 at every day all the time. It never, I never went 15 to a judge. I never to anybody else complaining 16 about it. I live with it. 17 This -- he didn't do anything wrong by saying 18 something that was on his conscience. He just said 19

This -- he didn't do anything wrong by saying something that was on his conscience. He just said it. And it, there's nothing we can do about that, but we live in a city that the water bill is so dad gum high you can't even drink the water. You can't bathe in the water. My water bill is 190, \$200 every stinking month, we got five, six, five commissioners up here, and they go on a trip every

month, go on it every year because I went. I was it's mayor. I was city commissioner.

MAYOR PATTERSON: I helped you. I campaigned for you.

JOHNNY LINTON: Okay, but I'm tell you right now, there better be some changes or there are going to be some changes. Either there's going — we going to change — Jim is the best man I've ever met in my life. He goes to my church. He's a Christian, he's a leader in the church. He's a really fine person. He's got a great family, and I'm going to tell you what, there's three or four of you here that won't be here next year if you mess with him.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Thank you, sir. (Applause from audience.)

BENNY ROBERTS: My name is Benny Roberts.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Hey, Mr. Benny.

BENNY ROBERTS: And I'm the historian in this building. I served three city manager, Charlie Brock three times, Alton Ferris one time so I'm talking about, I'm talking about 26 years of service I was a city commissioner. I worked for the city for five years straightening out the ball parks and running the recreation, so I've been in the city

hall 31 years so I -- I know about what went on and who went on with it you know:

So anyway, city managers became a problem.

Right, Mr. Mayor, Mr. Pate wanted a city manager so city managers had a lot more power in a sense than Charlie Brock. Charlie Brock was a, was the bookkeeper, and he's say right quick we ain't got the money. I mean he — if he didn't cut — he was tough. If we didn't have the money, we didn't do it. And when I left the city, we had three million dollars in Citizens Federal. In two years it was two million dollars in the hole.

You know people don't mind spending somebody else's money. It's easy to spend somebody else's money.

UNIDENTIFIED: That's right.

BENNY ROBERTS: But politicians are really kind of bad about spending somebody else's money because y'all -- and it doesn't matter if you have to borrow it. It don't matter. I mean the city -- what -- what have y'all got \$150,000, \$120,000 in debts you have to pay off for bad water bills? Y'all got that? Is that pretty correct? Is that pretty close? Yeah, pretty close. You paid off everybody. And did you ever think about this, the people that

have bad water bills that live at the beach don't live in the city of Port St. Joe, and when you take city tax dollars to subsidize somebody that don't pay his water bill, you taking my money to pay his water bill. You every think about that? You ought to think about it.

Now this -- this situation has gotten out of hand, and I've only had three occasions to talk to this city -- city manager. Courteous, diligent, did what he said he was going to do, and then the next day it happened, you know. I couldn't not ask for any better service. And so all I'm saying is you might want to look at your own self.

And by the way, you was talking about North Port St. Joe, when I was on that board, I went, talked to the Northwest Government Development Council, and the guy came to me and said Benny, y'all wanting water and sewer, but I can get you some money for recreation, and I said how much. He said well we'll ask for 120,000, and we had just traded the — the Northside, belonged to the school board, we traded them for that baseball park over there. We gave that to the school. So we traded out. So then we had to tear our building down, but we didn't have any money to fix it up, so this buy

1 came by, and he said hey, if you'll ask for a grant 2 for that, you can get it because they on recreation this year. So I went back over there, he called me 3 back. He said we're going to ask for 120,000. We 4 5 got the \$95,000. That was a grant that went to 6 Northside that people it was, they never -- one of 7 the candidates that ran said oh, we never got any 8 grants over there. Yeah, you got 95,000. Then they turned around and told -- excuse me. 9 10 MAYOR PATTERSON: No, sir, the three minutes up on that. 11 BENNY ROBERTS: Okay. All right, next --12 MAYOR PATTERSON: The next in the aisle. 13 14 BENNY ROBERTS: Okay. All right, next -- all right, the next, next thing was we got another grant 15 16 for 50,000. So we -- North Port St. Joe has been 17 remembered, I promise you. 18 MAYOR PATTERSON: Has what? BENNY ROBERTS: Been remembered as far as --19 20 MAYOR PATTERSON: Walk over there and look. 2.1 BENNY ROBERTS: Yeah, walk over there --MAYOR PATTERSON: See if it's been remembered. 22 BENNY ROBERTS: What? 23 24 MAYOR PATTERSON: I'll say it ain't been

25

remembered.

1 BENNY ROBERTS: Well --MAYOR PATTERSON: You go over there and look at 2 3 it. BENNY ROBERTS: Well you know who's running it 4 5 now? Y'all threw it to the county. Amen, brother. 6 MAYOR PATTERSON: Right. Thank you, Mr. Ben. 7 Thank you, sir. 8 UNIDENTIFIED: Hey, from where I growed up 9 North Port St. Joe, it is improving a great lot, and that's the onliest thing I need to say. And it 10 11 comes from that man making things look --1.2 UNIDENTIFIED: You say it's improved? 1.3 UNIDENTIFIED: He's trying. It is --UNIDENTIFIED: Where you been at? 14 15 UNIDENTIFIED: It is improving. You say you growed up here? I growed up here 16 17 too, my friend. MAYOR PATTERSON: Gentlemen, please. Yes, sir? 18 19 NATHAN PETERS: Yes, sir, Mr. Mayor, you know 20 I'm retired now at the age of 69 years old. been a citizen of this community all my life, entire 21 22 69 years. I started participating in politics back in 1985 when I was first elected to city commission, 23 and I went on and became a county commissioner for 24

24 consecutive years. Now I do know something about

politics and the way it works.

I want to say that from 1985 when I was elected to city commissioner, I had relationships with all the board members and all the people that worked for the city, and I knew all the way up to Jim, Jim came in. I believe it was in 2012, and he's been here about six years, that long.

Now I've had relationship with managers before him, and I had relationships with him his entire six years. I'm going to tell you something, and this is the God in heaven truth, I don't know a better person that we could have in that position than Jim. (Audience applause.)

He's been honest, and he's been supportive of my community. He can't do it, Langston, he can't. You just got there. He can't do it that fast. Government don't work that way.

MAYOR PATTERSON: I wasn't saying that it can happen --

NATHAN PETERS: Overnight.

COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: -- overnight. I was saying that throughout the years, and you -- you was a city commissioner. It's been a while. You were the county commissioner and pretty fine one.

NATHAN PETERS: Thank you.

1 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: But the thing about it is that we've been, these past 10 years we've just 2 3 been deprived. I mean, and the guy said that you can go over there and look at it right now. The 4 5 only thing that we got standing on MLK is your 6 business. And I'm not saying that's bad. 7 good thing because it makes people want to strive to 8 do better, but we need more things to come in to try 9 to help us --NATHAN PETERS: Yeah but Langston, you remember 10 when Avenue A was completely tore up --11 12 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: Yes, sir. 13 NATHAN PETERS: -- and they put in a new sewer system in that, on Avenue A all the way down. 14 15 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: Yes, sir. NATHAN PETERS: And then, and then we had 16 17 problems with the water. Not just North Port St. Joe but all of Port St. Joe had problems with the 18 19 water. 20 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: Right. 21 NATHAN PETERS: And they worked with us to get 22 that fixed. We got pretty good water now. 23 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: Uh-huh. NATHAN PETERS: You know what I'm saying? 24 25 it takes time to do that. But I'm here to say that

Mr. Anderson, I don't know of a better person to have in that position, and I support him

100 percent. Thank you, gentlemen.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Thank you, sir. (Audience applause.)

TRAVIS BURGE: Mr. Mayor, Commissioners, I'm

Travis Burge. I live at 2011 Garrison Avenue, Port

St. Joe. Most of you know me. I've been here, I'm

telling on my age, but 60 years.

I just want to speak on behalf of Jim. I've been on the PDRB for two, maybe going on three years. Nothing but respect for Jim. Jim is a man of integrity. I've interacted with him on this board with issues, and he has brought nothing but integrity, and he has got the city's and the taxpayers of this community at heart in everything he does, and that's a fact. That's dealing with him straight.

Some of you know me, some don't. Rex Buzzett,
I appreciate the kind comments and the diplomatic
approach that he brought before you others. Pretty
obvious where the three votes are. And as I think
Brett you said earlier, the rumors and everything
else, well a little bit of that comes to light, son.
And I'm going to tell you something with each one of

you, Mr. Lowry, I've known you since you were
little, you and your brother. You know that.

COMMISSIONER LOWRY: Uh-huh.

TRAVIS BURGE: I have a lot of respect, and Brett, I'm seeing a different pretty Brett, and I'll tell you, if your granddaddy was around, he'd roll over, son.

UNIDENTIFIED: Uh-huh, that's right.

TRAVIS BURGE: That is not diplomatic what you're doing. Mr. Buzzett has brought something to the table that was ignored. He made the motion anyway. Eric, I've known your mama back, used to work years ago, what, back in the '80s, good woman. I remember when you were in her arms, and I'm going to tell you something, son, search your heart. Do it a diplomatic way. Don't come in here and be led. I feel like you're led.

COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: No, I'm not being led.

TRAVIS BURGE: I really do, you know.

UNIDENTIFIED: He the next of the Langstons. Ain't no leading.

TRAVIS BURGE: Mr. Mayor, had the privilege of talking to you a couple of days ago. My dad called you, called me over there. We had our discussion, and in that discussion I told you what some of the

rumors were that I heard because I wanted to know.

I did not know. But we have a right as citizens,
everyone in this room that's here to represent Mr.

Anderson, and we're asking you to be diplomatic. Do
not let petty personality clashes, differences spoil
your ability as mayor. I think you've already done
that, but Bo, that's wrong. What you've told me
wasn't nothing but a personality clash.

Now isn't there -- well I understand there's a process, a diplomatic process that Mr. Buzzett has brought to the table, and it needs to be followed.

You don't just come in and threaten a man to resign, if that's what's true, without any due process?

It's ridiculous. And the people in this community are tired of it. Don't know what's in the background behind it, if there's any motivation. I heard there was.

Mr. Mayor, I mention to you those rumors and the fact that it, Mr. Lowery had approached Mr. Anderson is the story I heard, and in that story I said you know there's others that were mentioned behind Mr. Lowry with this, and you come out with a name. And I'm not going to, let's don't name drop --

COMMISSIONER LOWRY: -- uh-huh.

TRAVIS BURGE: -- but you pretty much in my opinion told on yourself when you brought that up when you named the name.

COMMISSIONER LOWRY: I'll talk to you. That issue --

TRAVIS BURGE: I didn't name the name.

COMMISSIONER LOWRY: Yeah.

TRAVIS BURGE: So what I, what I'd like to say just in closing, I challenge everyone of you, look at each other, search your soul, and one of you has initiated this. Somebody has. It took one. The smoke started by one of you and it went from there. So put it on the table instead of under the table is all I ask.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Thank you, sir. (Audience applause.)

GREG JOHNSON: Gentlemen, I'm James G. Greg

Johnson. I live at 128 Heritage Lane, Port St. Joe,

Florida. I had the privilege many years ago to

serve on this board and during that time I had the

privilege of working with Mr. Anderson. We had some

bad, bad economic times at that time. In fact I

remember one meeting where Mr. Weston and Mr.

Anderson and I sat down, we didn't know how we were

going to meet payroll in two years, or two weeks.

We worked hard. We called a special meeting. We got it resolved, but it was Mr. Anderson who led the charge and helped us understand where we were.

Since that time this man with his staff has created a positive balance in the city. I commend him for that, and y'all are crazy as heck if you run him off. He's the only one up there that has any idea what's going on, and if y'all lose this leadership, you going to be on a slope that's going to go downhill so fast a freight train couldn't stop it.

So I'm asking you to reconsider. Do like what some of the other speakers have said, talk to the man. If you have issues, work them out like a normal human being would do that runs a successful business.

This is a major business, and y'all are operating it like two kids with a baseball. I -- it's got to stop. It -- I had a very intelligent man one time tell me, Greg, don't ever criticize somebody in public. You criticize in private. You praise in public, but I can't do that with y'all today because I'm not happy with you. I -- I too believe that there's something going on behind the scenes that has caused this. Mr. Anderson has stepped on somebody's toes by telling them what the

charter says and what his marching orders adopted by y'all says do. I honestly believe that. And sometime since I got off this board y'all initiated a, an increase in your compensation to cover your cell phone usage. If I'm not mistaken, each of you get a stipend each month for your cell phone. Is that correct?

MAYOR PATTERSON: Sure.

GREG JOHNSON: Well today I'm formally requesting under the Florida Statute No. 10 Chapter 119 Section 11901 a copy of everyone of your cell phone bills from May -- April the 1st in 2011. (Audience applause.)

MAYOR PATTERSON: All right let's hold it down please. Yes, ma'am?

LINDA TESHUTTI: I'm Linda Teshutti, Port St. Joe, Florida.

First of all, we should have prayed because there's enough heat in here to start a fire, so we need Jesus. That's who we need, and all I have to say is that I've known this man since he was in second grade, but there is a lot of people that I know. I want everybody to deep inside dig in your heart. Ask God to watch over you because a lot of people are not right. If you do what's right in

your heart, we wouldn't be having this meeting today.

You people have got to change, myself as well. Get your heart right and stop doing favoritism for one and not the other one. Get it right with God.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Thank you, ma'am.

UNIDENTIFIED: Amen.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Yes, sir?

QUEN LAMB: My name is Quen Lamb. I live at (inaudible).

AUDIENCE: We can't hear:

MAYOR PATTERSON: Talk up a little bit.

QUEN LAMB: Quen Lamb, 1203 Palm Boulevard.

I at one time was director of People Helping
People program, and I had many opportunities to deal
with Jim in helping people with their — their fuel
bills, with food, et cetera. Not once did I ever
have a rejection by Jim or a problem with Jim
relative to bringing a citizen's problems to him.
He worked with me. He was cooperative. He was
understanding of the people's problems. As a matter
of fact, yesterday I went to the north side and got
some petitions signed in favor of supporting Jim,
and I don't know how many people remembered me and
said to me how wonderful Jim was in helping get the

problems solved. And he was absolutely understanding. I don't think we ever had an argument. We may had a disagreement on — on what figure to arrive at, but he was absolutely outstanding. And I would back that lady that just spoke before me that in my 82 years of living I cannot believe what I'm seeing or hearing this morning.

I have owned companies. I have run companies, large companies. Never, I hope never in my day would we have ever treated an employee as you people are treating Jim this morning. It's disgusting, and you need to really step back and take a look at yourself, but my support goes for Jim 100 percent. So thank you very much.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Thank you.

CHARLES GILBERT: Charles Gilbert, 118 Liberty Street. I'm here -- I'm not supporting, but I am supporting but the fact of it is I think we here for the wrong reason because the fact it shouldn't be about Jim. It should be about policies and procedures.

Now if we were going to have, and yeah I can say this, former employee of the city of Port St.

Joe running recreation department for a long time,

and, but policies and procedures if we had them in place, we wouldn't be here doing this today.

Because first of all, if you had a grievance with whoever then you got a grievance committee that it should have went through them to see if you had just cause even to be here today.

Now my thing is this, I'm also a preacher in this community. I've been one for over 32 years. I don't care what you say he said, because everybody got a story to tell, and everybody going to make their side look as best as they possibly can. But the fact of the matter is, I don't care who it is, everybody is due process of being fair. And you guys sit here, like I said you here to represent the people.

Now I will agree that I heard some stuff about the grants. Oh, I know a lot of grants done come, but I know that they went, they came in one area and then they went somewhere else to put pipes somewhere else and it was named something else. Yeah, I do know that too, but like I said, I'm not here for that today.

The city need to have -- do you have a policy in place how you deal with employees? Has anybody looked at his jacket? From what I heard, his jacket

is perfect. Did he get reprimanded any time? Did anybody write him up for insubordination?

See what I'm saying? This what I'm saying, we -- we can, yeah, we can get a cause because I don't care who you are, if you can get enough people supporting you it will make a lot of people change their minds, but if you do things from your heart and your mind that when you go home at the end of the night, you can rest in peace. You're not going, you're not going to make everybody happy, but you know what you did when your heart was the best decision that you was making for the people, not because I'm mad at Mr. Langston, not because I'm mad at Mr. Bo. I'm not here for that. I'm here simply stating that the city need to have some type of policy in place so that they can deal with the employees.

What I'm seeing, and this is the way I feel, the city will work you all their, your life, and when the time for them to stand up for you, you ain't, you're out on a boat by yourself. So my thing is before you want to do what you're doing, I think we need to kind of regroup and look at the situation from your heart and see if it's justified. It may be. I don't know what happened. I'm not

going to get into you said he said, but it may be that he might need to be wrote up but why? Is it bad enough to terminate a man? This man -- and I'm saying whoever, if they got a family, they got to feed people, and you get mad at me because I tell you or come up with or say something that you don't like, and you just get rid of me, that's -- you know with I'm saying? Because I don't care who you are we're going to have some differences, and the most sacred place you can have is in the church, and you have differences there. So I don't care where you go you're going to have differences but it's the way you -- it's all depending on how you handle your differences.

So, and like I said that's what I'm hearing.

I'm not seeing Mr. Anderson, I'm seeing the problem.

And this problem, if you do -- do it with him, you do with other employees, and you don't have a guideline, you're going to have this issue from time to time, but if you've got a guideline of procedure, they need to be followed and they need to be followed for everybody.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Thank you Charles.

SANUEL ANDERSON, JR.: I'm Samuel Anderson, Jr, 521 9th Street. I've lived here for 32 years, my

entire life, and Mr. Bo, I say with all respect, Mr. Bo, honestly I have some questions about you but that's not what we're here for. I'm going to comment toward you saying that Mr. Jim got hostile with you in the office per se.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Yes, sir.

SANUEL ANDERSON, JR.: I have a four-month old daughter that I love with all my heart. I would die for her. If I ever had to leave her with somebody outside of my family, Mr. Jim would be the first person I would leave them with. Do you think I would leave him, leave her with him knowing that he has a hostile mean attitude or anything like that? I don't think so. That's -- that's towards your reason why you feel like you're -- you're threatened by him. I wouldn't do that.

Brett, I -- I grew up watching you, you know high school. I wanted to be your friend, wanted to talk to you and everything else. I mean for you, for you to being up here on this board and for somebody in this audience to ask you a question, you got a I ain't got no response for right now, when you put that, when you put that name and that tag in front of you, you got to respond to us when we ask you a question. I'm sorry, that's part of the job.

Bo said it hisself, our code enforcement officer needs to find another job, well if you can't answer the questions that are brought to you, maybe you need to find another job. I hate that. I'm sorry but that's the way it is.

I mean, Mr. Langston, I understand completely where you're coming from. I've got plenty of friends over there. I'd do anything in the world for them. Love them to death, but it takes time.

And I understand where you're coming from but it takes time. It takes effort. It takes blood, sweat and tears and it will come. I promise you, it will come. All you got to do is work and be patient.

But Mr. Jim, he's a fine man. He works hard. I see it day in and day out. I'm around town all day every day five days a week.

Mr. Buzzett, he put a good thing on the, idea on there, everybody's talking about it. I don't think we've had one person come up here and say yeah, Mr. Jim needs to be gone because nobody believes it. If you've got a personal vendetta with him after hours, you need to pull him to the side and Mr. Jim, can I talk to you, and we'll hash this out like two grown men and not like a little kid in the candy, in the play, in the playground. That's

the way I feel about it.

Now he hasn't done his job, it's your job as his bosses to get rid of him, to come to him and say hey, I've been pulled off to the side on the my jobs plenty of times, hey, you need to work on your attitude. Hey, you need to work on your productivity, you know? Hey, they gave me a chance. Guess what, I heard it loud and clear. I kept my job. I'm going to keep my job just like Mr. Jim will and that's all I got to say about that.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Thank you.

BARB VANTRESE: My name's Barb Vantrese, 1311
McClellan Avenue, and I want to thank you
commissioners for having a meeting. I wish it
wasn't under these circumstances.

Bo, you have worked and helped me out with some problems, and I do appreciate that, but Mr. Anderson has come to my aid when I came to him with a sign problem for the Humane Society. We had to go through state. We had to go through city, and we had to go through county. He took me step by step for weeks to get this thing done because of his knowledge of what he needed, what I needed. I'd go to him, and he'd say no, Miss Barb, this isn't right. You've got to have it this a way, and I'd go

back and get it done, bring it to him. He is somebody that replacing him is going to almost be impossible for the knowledge that he has had for the years that he has served this community. Thank you. Thank you, Jim.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Thank you, ma'am.

Mayor meeting with individual commissioners or city council members, if a mayor or a member of the council has a voice in the decision making through the power to break tie votes, meetings between the mayor and a member of the city council to discuss some matter come, which may come before the city council are subject to the Sunshine Law.

MAYOR PATTERSON: Uh-huh.

STEVEN WOMACK: So when one or more of you, two of you get together outside of this meeting without that meeting being open to the public, that reasonable notice be given and that the minutes of the meeting are to be taken and promptly recorded then that's a violation of the Sunshine Law. As discussed by some of the other citizens present today, it seems or appears, and it may be hard to prove, that certain members of this board got together, I hate to use the word colluded, and decided that somebody had to go, and for what reason?

We've already acknowledged through the citizens present that Jim is a fantastic person. He's a great manager. My estimation of this is

specifically that he said no or is not onboard with 1 certain members of this board to spend certain 2 3 monies, and so you are going to get rid of him and put in a yes man who is going to then say yes to all 4 5 the monies that you're proposing to spend. And there's at least three of you that have colluded and 6 7 have met and talked outside of the public, the 8 Sunshine Laws, in order to spend other people's money, our money. And I can't prove it yet, but I'm 9 here to tell you, and these people know, the 10 11 motivation for all this is not Jim. It's not you, it's money. Come back Tuesday. 12 13 (Audience applause.) 14 When's the next meeting? 15 MAYOR PATTERSON: Tuesday. STEVEN WOMACK: Tuesday, what time? 16 MAYOR PATTERSON: 17 Six. 18 STEVEN WOMACK: And I expect all of you to be here to keep the, these people honest. 19 20 MAYOR PATTERSON: Thank you, sir. We never agreed on everything, but there was a point in time when the city could not even pay its bills. This man steadied the ship, Bo. He has financially managed this city beyond belief, I'm telling you.

Commissioner, I served with Commissioner

Buzzett. He knows what I'm talking about. This man has done a -- a yeoman's job. And for y'all to railroad this man like y'all -- Brett, I -- I don't know what to say, Brett. I am so disappointed right now. I sat in that seat where you're sitting. You have, you have thoroughly disappointed me this morning. And Eric, I'm going to tell you one thing, Jim Anderson does not make policy. Y'all make policy. What gets done, y'all drive the policy. And if there's projects to get done, y'all drive those policies. It's not up to Jim.

He's listening to five bosses and that's the tough -- hardest job any man will ever do, I'll

leave it at that. 1 2 MAYOR PATTERSON: Thank you, Phil. 3 (Audience applause.) All right, does anyone else want to speak? 4 5 right, so where we at? MR. ALBRITTON: The only action item the 6 7 commission can take as I've previously said pursuant 8 to Section 34 at this time is there cannot be a 9 termination of employment. The only other action leaving is suspension. That's what Section 34 says. 10 Or adjournment, those are the only options. 11 12 COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: I want to instruct and ask the board to not consider that option. We've 13 14 got a good man running the ship. Let's let him run 15 it and due process play out. 16 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: I think that we shouldn't suspend him right now and let him stay in 17 18 the job he's in until he have his say in court or whatever until we can discuss it any further. 19 20 MAYOR PATTERSON: Is that a motion? 21 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: I'm talking right now. 22 But if --(Audience can't hear Commissioner Langston.) 23 24 MAYOR PATTERSON: They can't hear you. 25 COMMISSIONER LANGSTON: I'm sorry. I'm sorry.

I feel like we shouldn't suspend him right now. 1 We should leave him in the position where he can 2 3 continue his job and until he have due process, and 4 we feel can we step back and see what -- what the next step is. I'll make that a motion. 5 COMMISSIONER BUZZETT: Second. 6 7 MAYOR PATTERSON: All right, we've got a motion on the floor, we got a second. Any discussion? All 9 in favor say aye. 10 (All commissioners say aye.) The motion carries five zero. I need a motion 11 12 to adjourn. 13 COMMISSIONER ASHBROOK: So move. 14 MAYOR PATTERSON: So moved.
