MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING OF THE BOARD OF CITY COMMISSIONERS FOR THE CITY OF PORT ST. JOE, FLORIDA, HELD AT 2775 GARRISON AVENUE, December 5, 2023, at Noon.

The following were present: Mayor Buzzett, Commissioners, Hoffman, Langston, and Lowry. City Manager Jim Anderson, City Clerk Charlotte Pierce, and City Attorney Clinton McCahill were also present. Commissioner Kerrigan was absent.

CONSENT AGENDA

Minutes

A Motion was made by Commissioner Hoffman, second by Commissioner Lowry, to approve the Minutes of the Regular Meeting of November 21, 2023. All in favor; Motion carried 4-0.

City Engineer

Beacon Hill Sewer

BTC is continuing with bores. NFC has finished laying pipe on Cockles Avenue but has a few tie-ins to complete. They are laying pipe on Olive Avenue at Bonnet Street working west and finished up the week about 100' west of Helmet Street. NFC is waiting on more valves, caps, reducers, etc., to arrive for tie-ins but NFC will continue laying pipe on Olive Avenue heading west.

Madison Street Paving

The Notice of Award and Agreement have been provided to the City. Anchor CEI will set up a preconstruction meeting and issue the Notice to Proceed.

Allen Memorial SCOP Grant

A survey has been ordered.

Wastewater Sprayfield Task Order

Dewberry is waiting on the survey field work.

HMGP Grant - Elevation of 12 Lift Stations

The Survey and Sight Plans have been completed. Dewberry is currently working on design of the platforms.

City Complex Conceptual Design

Two options are currently in design. Mayor Buzzett requested that the City Hall face Cecil G. Costin, Sr., Blvd.

Tenth Street Sports Complex

Dewberry anticipates providing the City with a concept for review next week.

Second Street Conceptual Design.

This project is in design.

City Attorney

Resolution 2023-14, CIP Plan

A Motion was made by Commissioner Langston, second by Commissioner Lowry, to approve Resolution 2023-14 CIP Plan. All in favor; Motion carried 4-0.

Resolution 2023-15, FDOT Paving Grant

A Motion was made by Commissioner Hoffman, second by Commissioner Langston, to approve Resolution 2023-15, FDOT Paving Grant. All in favor; Motion carried 4-0.

Old Business

City Projects

Mr. Anderson shared that the ESAD Sewer upgrade has been completed and that Monolith is working on the rocks for Clifford Sims Park.

New Business

Pickleball Courts

A Motion was made by Commissioner Langston, second by Commissioner Lowry, for City Staff to begin working on a new design for two additional courts and the rehabbing of the current facility. All in favor; Motion carried 4-0. Anticipated costs include improvements of approximately \$100,000 and resurfacing of \$12,000. Currently, there is no written commitment from Gulf County to help with these expenses.

Holiday Schedule

A Motion was made by Commissioner Lowry, second by Commissioner Hoffman, to observe the following holiday meeting schedule. The Commission meetings of December 19, 2023, and January 2, 2024, are cancelled. The Port St. Joe Redevelopment Agency meeting of January 2, 2024, is also cancelled. The Planning, Development, and Review Board Meeting of January 2, 2024, has been rescheduled for January 9, 2024.

A Motion was made by Commissioner Hoffman, second by Commissioner Lowry, for the Employee Appreciation Luncheon to be held Friday, December 22, 2023, at Noon. Employees attending the luncheon may begin their Christmas holidays after the luncheon. All in favor; Motion carried 4-0.

Public Works - John Grantland

Madison Street CEI Services Contract

A Motion was made by Commissioner Hoffman, second by Commissioner Langston, to accept the contract from Anchor CEI as presented in the amount of \$19,850. All in favor; Motion carried 4-0.

A Motion was made by Commissioner Langston, second by Commissioner Lowry, to accept the Change Order reduction from Southeast Pipe Survey in the amount of \$19,545.00. All in favor; Motion carried 4-0.

Surface Water Plant - Larry McClamma

Brad Key - Chemtrade, PAC Presentation

Brad Key and Vincent Martin made a presentation to the Commission concerning Poly Aluminum Chloride, as an alternative for Ferric Sulfate, the benefits of using it, and the cost savings it will provide.

A Motion was made by Commissioner Hoffman, second by Commissioner Langston, for a Pilot Study to be done using the Poly Aluminum Chloride. All in favor; motion carried 4-0.

Wastewater Plant

Mr. Pettis was unable to attend the meeting and Joe Harris shared that there is 1' of freeboard in the lagoon. He noted that parts are coming in for the pumps that need to be repaired, and that over 9" was lost in the lagoon due to all the rain last weekend.

Finance Director - Mike Lacour

FEMA Update

Mr. Lacour shared that providing rocks for Clifford Sims Park is the final FEMA Project.

Grants Reimbursement Update

Mr. Lacour continues to work on grant reimbursements.

Code Enforcement

Mr. Anderson shared that Code Enforcement has identified over 100 derelict vehicles in the City. Staff is researching language for enforcement.

Police Department – Chief Richards

Chief Richards noted that his department is working on the Christmas Parade, electric billboards have been placed in the neighborhoods about detours, and Highway 98 will be closed 10 minutes prior to the parade.

He reminded citizens of the holiday house check if they will be out of town and encouraged citizens to call the police department and sign up for the service. Chief Richards shared that this service is provided throughout the year and is not just for holidays.

City Clerk - Charlotte Pierce

Grants Update

Staff continues to work on grant compliance in addition to seeking additional grant sources.

Christmas Parade

Ms. Pierce noted the parade continues to grow, there are over 80 entries as of today, and if the weather is an issue, a decision will be made Friday afternoon concerning having the parade Saturday evening.

Citizens to be Heard

Chester Davis referenced a program that was held at the Washington Gym, encouraged the Commission to match any opportunities for grants with the NPSJ PAC, and thanked the Commission for the new bathrooms at the Washington site. He also asked about mitigating properties in North Port St. Joe.

Robert Branch shared his understanding of the Florida Stormwater Erosion and Sedimentation Control Inspectors Manual concerning the Tenth Street Sports Complex.

Christy McElroy shared her concerns about the drainage basin of the Tenth Street Park and the construction at the corner of Woodard Avenue and Highway 71.

Eddie Fields asked about repairs and improvements for the WIG Bathrooms, and additional Christmas lights for Langston Drive and MLK Boulevard.

Arthur Miller asked about the LNG Plant and Mayor Buzzett responded that that was a dead issue.

Joe Whitmer, Gulf County Chamber of Commerce Director, thanked the Commissioners for their work in relocating the Farmer's Market, noted there are some electrical issues in Core Park, and feels that Reid Avenue is looking very good.

Mayor Buzzett thanked Mr. Whitmer and his group for putting the Christmas lights on the lighthouse again this year.

Discussion Items by Commissioners

Commissioner Hoffman asked about the letter to Mediacom and Mr. Anderson shared that he had talked with a representative concerning this and will follow up with a letter as requested.

Commissioner Lowry did not have anything additional to discuss.

Commissioner Langston is concerned about people using private property to pass people stopped at the stop sign on Avenue A and Highway 98. Chief Richards and Mr. Grantland will look into this.

Mayor Buzzett wished everyone a Merry Christmas, a Happy New Year, encouraged them to be safe, and shop local when you can.

It is our understanding that the planning board may need some clarification in regard to the final plat submitted for the Retreat at Palmetto Bluff Phase 2 Subdivision and what we are asking for a conditional approval. Please see the clarifications below.

- 1. This plat cover lots 66-85 of the Palmetto Bluff Subdivision which are the final lots of the subdivision.
- 2. The Homeowner Association (HOA) and Covenants and Restrictions will be completed prior to the signing of the plat.
- 3. Both Water and Sewer have been certified through FDEP.
- 4. The utility as-builts will be supplied and approved by city staff prior to the signing of the plat.
- 5. The road is proposed to have two (2) 1-inch lifts of asphalt for final completion. Prior to the signing of the plat, one (1) 1-inch lift will be completed for the Cove and entrance road section. We acknowledge that we will still be responsible for the final lift of asphalt prior to the road dedication to the city. The final lift of asphalt has already been laid on both Retreat phases.
- 6. The H.O.A Stormwater Management Facilities certification will be submitted and approved by NWFWMD prior to the signing of the plat.

ORDINANCE NO.: 608

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF PORT ST. JOE, FLORIDA ADOPTING FEES RELATING TO THE CITY'S UTILITIES MORE SPECIFICALLY A CONVENIENCE FEE FOR CREDIT CARD TRANSACTIONS; A FEE FOR SERVICE CALLS; AND A FEE FOR HYDRANT RENTALS; PROVIDING FOR REPEAL OF ALL ORIDINANCES AND RESOLUTIONS IN CONFLICT HEREWITH; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the City of Port St. Joe, Florida provides numerous facilities and programs for the benefit of the public; and

WHEREAS, these programs and facilities require considerable expenditure of public funds; and

WHEREAS, it is appropriate for the actual users of these facilities and programs to bear a portion of the costs thereof; and

WHEREAS, the fees herein adopted are related to utilities and therefore must comply with the notice procedures required in Chapter 180.136 Florida Statutes; and

WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of the City Commission and the people of the City of Port St. Joe to adopt the fees enumerated below relating to utilities; and

NOW THEREFORE, be it enacted by the people of the City of Port St. Joe, Florida, as follows:

- 1. The City Commission hereby adopts the Convenience Fee for credit card transactions, the Service Fee for service calls, and the Fee for Hydrant Rental as contained in the attached Exhibit "A" which is made a part hereof.
- 2. REPEAL. All ordinances and resolutions in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.
- 3. SEVERABILITY. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, such portion shall be deemed a separate, distinct, and independent provision and such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions thereof.



PORT ST. JOE: THE WAY RESILIENCE LOOKS

A Collective Approach toward Demonstrative Projects of Resilience

INTRODUCTION

Port St. Joe has experienced a strong recovery since Hurricane Michael struck in 2018. Since then, new residents have moved in, repairs and remodeling have addressed the hurricane damage, and the tourism industry has flourished. Additionally, the pursuit of grants to address environmental pollution challenges, flood mitigation, Nature-Based Solutions, and urban flood vulnerability assessment throughout the town has produced a surge of collaborations and research, aiming for a more resilient Port St. Joe.



'The Way Resilience Looks' initiative aims to create and install three temporary interventions within the urban fabric of Port St. Joe to demonstrate how resilience can be achieved. We will engage with locals to bring these interventions to life engaging them in a process of seeing, experiencing, and understanding. Our goal is to show how complex data-driven strategies can lead to community resilience and enhance the sense of place. Our mission is threefold: to educate the community about initiatives occurring in Port St. Joe, encourage active participation of residents, and envision effective climate-change mitigation strategies.

This inititative has been structured through three projects each led by a team. Each team, while working on distinct projects, shares the overarching mission of enhancing Port St. Joe's resilience.







DEMONSTRATION PROJECT 1:

INLAND GREEN INFRASTRUCTURE

GOAL

This demonstration of inland green infrastructure aims to showcase designs that can potentially be adopted along the stream corridor and other open spaces in the city. Through a pilot plant installation, to the project will help community members visualize the positive changes that nature-based solutions can bring while building a more resilient future.

ACTIONS

1. Design Option Development

UF Department of Landscape Architecture students attending the Planting Design Studio (LAA 2361C, Course Instructor: Dr. Jiayang Li, Reviewer: Dr. Gail Hansen) in 2024 Spring will team up to develop 3 to 5 designs that planting feature different typologies around a pond. The actual number of designs that are implemented will depend on the class size. Each design will occupy a segment (about 20-30' x 10-30') along the banks. Ideally, the $Figure 1_Identification of possible locations in yellow$ implementation can take place



along the Forest Park Avenue, from 16th Street to 20th street (see Figure 2). Selection of specific segments for implementation will be determined by taking into account the number of student groups, the pedagogical structure of the course syllabus, and the most educational value for the students involved.

2. Plant Installation and Maintenance

FIBER is committed to enriching the local ecosystem by investing in native flora. FIBER will fundthe plant purchases. We are collaborating with the Garden Club of Port St., Joe, Ray Bodrey, the County Extension Director of UF/IFAS Extension, and local Master Gardeners who will implement the project in mid-March 2024. These efforts align with the principles of Florida-Friendly Landscaping $^{\text{TM}}$ (FFL), ensuring that the selection and installation of plants promote sustainability. There will be no need for maintenance from the city. For more information on Florida-Friendly Landscaping™ practices, visit https://ffl.ifas.ufl.edu/.

3. Event Day Community Engagement

We will organize public events in April to describe the project to the public. We will set up a temporary pavilion to provide residents with information regarding the practice and to present students' posters. City representatives are welcome to join these events, offering a platform for dialogue and community engagement, ensuring that the project not only serves but also represents the collective vision and interests of the residents.

DEMONSTRATION PROJECT 2:

A PORCH FOR COMMUNITY RESILIENCE

GOAL

This project envisions resilient housing through the construction of a porch. Historically, porches have connected private with public and people with nature, and today they continue to exemplify social and environmental resilience. During the pandemic they proved their continued significance as crucial forms of social distancing that allowed communities to stay in touch. Environmentally, porches are readymade spaces of acclimation—places to enjoy cooling breezes and to build connections with nature, as we witness climate change from our porches. This project builds a porch to serve as a foundation for community-building, housing, and fostering dialogue about resilience.

ACTIONS

1. Design Development

Students from UF's School of Architecture will design and build a temporary porch to serve as a starting point for discussions about housing resilience. Design/build is a form of community service in which students work directly with local stakeholders to envision a need, design it, and then actually build it. In this project, students will design and build a temporary porch based on discussions with the community and on an intensive study of local porches.

2. Resilient Porch Project Deployment

The design/build project will result in a temporary porch that can occupy empty lots to engage public discussion that will lead to visions for resilient housing. The porch will be readily moveable from site to site, and it will take the form of a kit of parts that can be assembled and reassembled. Consequently, the porch works as an installation. Additionally, this project will build ties between the University of Florida and local communities. Students will benefit from experiential learning that will inspire future forms of alternative practice, including design/build and nonprofit design.

3. Event Day Community Engagement

In April, we will host a public event to showcase the porch project to the community. We warmly invite city officials to participate in these events. Their presence will offer a valuable opportunity for conversation and civic involvement, ensuring the project not only meets the needs of the community but also reflects its shared aspirations and identity.

DEMONSTRATION PROJECT 3:

DUNES IN SCHOOLS-GULF COUNTY

GOAL

This This project will engage middle school students in understanding the importance of sea oats in coastal communities, the different types of Florida shorelines, how to build a beach dune naturally and understand the mystery behind tea-colored lakes as well as the characteristics of fish identification and finally identify how the land use around dunes has changed over time. Students will be engaged through numerous lessons with hands on activities, growing sea oats and ultimately planting sea oats in partnership with a local community.

ACTIONS

1. Pre-classroom planning

- UF in partnership with St. Andrew and St. Joseph Bays Estuary Program will
 make contacts with a local middle school teacher and principal interested in
 integrating the Dunes in School curriculum into their daily instruction.
- Materials will be purchased to support the hands on activities and a schedule created for UF and partners to enter the classroom and provide classroom support to the teacher/s including when to start growing the sea oats and the field trip.

2. In classroom instruction

- The UF/SASJBEP will purchase necessary materials to grow the sea oats in the classroom for a short period of time (few months). The materials will be provided to the students that will then plant the sea oats to begin the growing process.
- The UF/SASJBEP team will work with the teacher and students to maintain the sea oats and ensure survival.

3. Field Trip!

The UF/SASJBEP will work with the teacher and school to secure transportation for students to a location identified by project partners such as the city that will provide a location that can accommodate a large group of students. Logistics for maximize the experience for all students will be organized with the school and may require separate field trips depending on class size.
